#### A DREAM COME TRUE

A young professor was working in his workshop in a narrow street in Boston. He was totally absorbed in his strange machine he had been working on for about three years. Suddenly, he heard an almost inaudible sound, the first sound ever transmitted through a wire. The machine was the very first telephone and the young professor was Alexander Graham Bell. Although he was only 28 years old at the time, Bell had been working in the fields of speech, anatomy, electricity and telegraphy for over 11 years. His grandfather had invented a system to help people with speech problems. In fact, his whole family was involved in the study of speech and sounds. Bell's father had also written several books on how to speak correctly and created a form of sign language called 'visible speech'.

At the age of 17, Bell started to help teach young deaf mutes - children who could neither hear nor speak. He used his father's system and he achieved amazing results. Two years later, he agreed to give private lessons to a young boy whose family allowed him to use their basement as a workshop. This gave Bell the opportunity to experiment with sound transmitters. He used to spend all his free time and most of his money on his inventions. At that time he had another student who greatly influenced his life. She was a young girl who had lost her hearing and the ability to speak because of a childhood disease. Her name was Mabel Hubbard and four years later she and Bell got married.

Although many people believed that the plan to invent a human voice transmitter was a waste of time, Bell refused to give up his dream. Almost a year later, the first words were heard coming through the phone. On his 29th birthday, Bell registered his invention with the patent office and, because they had never seen anything like it before, they registered his invention as an 'improvement in telegraphy'. The name of 'telephone' came later.
